What is Hazard Mitigation?

Hazard mitigation is defined by FEMA as any sustained actions taken to reduce or eliminate the long-term risk to human life and property from hazards. This largely involves modifying the natural and built environment so that when hazardous events occur, the impact will be alleviated and minimal damage will occur. Hazard mitigation is a long-term, continuous process and related activities can occur at any phase in the emergency management cycle (see Recovery Continuum handout). Some activities can be easily implemented in a short timeframe, while others require significant time and resources to complete.

The following are just a few examples of hazard mitigation activities/projects for common natural hazards in Georgia:

Flood:

- Elevating or relocating structures out of floodplains
- Floodplain ordinances and regulations
- Improving storm drainage and waterways
- Levees and floodwalls
- Flood insurance

Storms:

- Building codes
- Safe rooms
- Infrastructure improvements
- Tree management

Wildfire:

- GIS mapping
- Defensible space/property maintenance
- Building codes

Why are we doing this?**Long Term Goal:**

The long term goal of hazard mitigation is to reduce disaster losses. This includes loss of life and damage to property, critical infrastructure or other structures. Other impacts can include social disconnection from displaced residents and economic impacts from businesses closing and tax revenues decreasing. History has shown that it can sometimes take several years for a community to recover from these losses.

Benefits:

The benefits to hazard mitigation are enormous and far-reaching. First and foremost, by offsetting the impacts of hazardous events, we are breaking the cycle of damage and repair. If a community has successfully mitigated most of its hazards, then when one of these events occurs, there will be no significant impact. This means that the community is not only safer to live in but also more resilient from hazard events which means the disaster recovery process will be much shorter and less involved. In addition, research has shown that for every \$1 invested in mitigation activities, society will benefit with an average return in \$4 saved (see handout Mitigation's Value to Society).

Federal Grant Eligibility:

With an approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plan, the community becomes eligible for certain types of Federal grant programs to assist in mitigation projects and related activities. One of the first questions asked by FEMA when reviewing project applications is: "Do you have an approved plan?"

There are two categories of Federal hazard mitigation grants which are **annual** and **post-disaster**. For annual grant programs, the community competes with other projects from around the country for a slice of money that is allocated for the entire nation. Post-disaster grant programs occur after a state has received a disaster declaration from the Federal government. With this declaration, the Federal government will allocate a certain amount of money that is used for just that state. Specific counties that were declared have first priority to that money, but sometimes there are additional funds available for counties that were not declared. The amount of post-disaster funds allocated to states is typically much larger than annual allocation for the entire nation; therefore, this is the most common source of funding for mitigation projects and activities.

Pre-Disaster Mitigation Competitive (PDM-C)

Federal Regulations

The requirement that local communities must have an approved hazard mitigation plan extends from the Disaster Mitigation Act of 2000 (DMA). Also under this law, once these plans are approved, the plan must be updated every five years in order to maintain its status of an approved plan. The regulations under DMA include specific requirements for local hazard mitigation plans. Interpretations of these regulations as well as guidance on compliance can be found in the FEMA document Local Multi-Hazard Mitigation Planning Guidance (2008). The guidance utilizes a tool called the Crosswalk which is how the plan will be reviewed to determine if the requirements are met. This document is available online or you can contact your GEMA planner for a copy.

Note: In October 2011, FEMA released a new guidance called the Local Mitigation Plan Review Guide. This document is intended to replace the 2008 guidance and is designed to be easier to follow and clarify the intent of the regulations. While there are no new regulations under this guide, there are some new interpretations of the regulations. The guide also features a new plan review tool which replaces the previous crosswalk. This new guide goes into effect starting October 1, 2012; therefore, all plans submitted after this date will be reviewed based on this guide. Up until that date, the use of the new guide is optional.

What does this plan do?

There are four main items that the hazard mitigation plan accomplishes:

1. Identify and profile the Hazards

Identifying the hazards involves determining which natural hazards will have an impact on the planning area. Only natural hazards are required in Local Hazard Mitigation Plans, but communities are welcome to include technological or man-made hazards. Plan reviews will only affect the natural hazard sections of the plan. For a complete listing of natural hazards that may have an impact on your community, please see the Georgia State Hazard Mitigation Strategy.

Once the hazards are identified for the planning area, then each must have a profile. The profile describes the location, extent and probability of the hazard event in the community. Location is the specific locations in the planning area that the hazard will impact. Examples include floodplains or wildland-urban interface fire zones. Some hazards may not have a specific location and affect the entire planning area. Extent is the potential magnitude or severity of the hazard event. In other words, the worst-case scenario the community is likely to experience. Probability is rate of return or frequency of the hazard event in the planning area. This needs to be a real, quantifiable number and is often this is determined based on hazard history or advanced statistical modeling.

2. Determine the Vulnerability

There are two key components to vulnerability. First, the plan needs to provide a description of the types of structures that can be affected by the hazard. Examples include, but not limited to, buildings, infrastructure, critical facilities, structures for housing the elderly or disabled, and areas where low-income populations reside. The second part of vulnerability is describing how the hazard will impact the identified structures such as the likely damage that will occur. Vulnerability impact can also be described in terms of structure loss (dollar value or percentage of damage) or functional loss. For additional information on vulnerability, please see the FEMA Local Multi-Hazard Mitigation Planning Guidance.

3. Determine the Risk

Once the community has an understanding of the hazards and vulnerabilities, this can be used to determine the overall risk for the planning area. While not required, it is suggested to develop an objective hazard ranking score that can be used to identify the hazards that impose the greatest risks and appropriately inform prioritization of mitigation actions.

4. Develop a Mitigation Strategy

The mitigation strategy includes goals and mitigation actions aimed at reducing long-term risk and vulnerabilities in the community. The community's hazard reduction goals are broad policy statements that explain what is to be achieved and guide the development and implementation of mitigation actions.

How do we do this?

Getting Started

The first step in the planning process is “preparing to plan” by organizing resources which will be used throughout the process. This involves building support from stakeholders, determining the technical and financial resources available, establishing the planning team and obtaining public participation.

Building the Planning Team

Hazard mitigation is more than just an emergency management function and requires commitment from the entire community to be successful. The best plans are the ones with a diverse group of stakeholder participation to bring in various expertise and community knowledge into the plan. Each unique stakeholder has an important role in the planning process. The following is a short list of suggested participants:

- Local government (Planning and Development, Public Works, Floodplain Manager, etc.)
- Non-government organizations
- Businesses and private sector
- Special districts and authorities
- Schools and colleges/universities
- Residents and community groups
- Neighboring jurisdictions
- Others

Related Documents

Among the technical resources available to communities are plans and other documents with information that can be integrated into the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan. The following is a brief summary of a few resources that are recommended to incorporate into the planning process.

Georgia State Hazard Mitigation Strategy (SHMS)

The Georgia SHMS is updated every three years and provides the natural hazard risk assessment and mitigation strategy for the state. When developing or updating a local hazard mitigation plan,

it is encouraged to review the state plan for information such as hazard data that can assist the planning process.

Local Comprehensive Plan

Comprehensive plans are developed for counties and cities for the purpose of guiding development and land use. These plans include a community vision for the future and strategies for achieving the vision. The community description in these plans provides details on community development issues and areas of opportunity. It is recommended to include land use maps in hazard mitigation plans to describe land use and development trends. Ensuring that future development is concentrated outside of hazard areas will reduce future risk to disasters. Adopting hazard mitigation plans into comprehensive plans is recommended to enhance the importance of natural hazard risk reduction as a part of the community's future.

Community Wildfire Protection Plan (CWPP)

The Georgia Forestry Commission (GFC) is actively involved in preparing CWPPs for communities in Georgia. These contain wildfire risk assessments and mitigation strategies for the community to reduce fire risks. Adding this information into the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan will strengthen the risk assessment and enhance the fire mitigation strategies.

Flood Insurance Study (FIS)

A Flood Insurance Study is a book that contains information regarding flooding in a community and is developed in conjunction with the Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM). The FIS, also known as a flood elevation study, frequently contains a narrative of the flood history of a community and discusses the engineering methods used to develop the FIRMs. The study also contains flood profiles for studied flooding sources and can be used to determine Base Flood Elevations for some areas. It is recommended to include FIS and DFIRM maps in hazard mitigation plans to provide detailed data on flood risks to the community.

Floodplain Ordinances

Once FEMA provides a community with the flood hazard information upon which floodplain management regulations are based, the community is required to adopt a floodplain management ordinance that meets or exceeds the minimum National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) requirements. The overriding purpose of the floodplain management regulations is to ensure that participating communities take into account flood hazards, to the extent that they are known, in all official actions relating to land management and use. It is recommended for communities to review and update the floodplain ordinance as a flood mitigation action.

Other Resources

Other documents and policies that should be considered include, but not limited to, building codes, capital improvement plans, local government financial plans, transportation plans, continuity of operations plans, and emergency operations plans.

The Plan Update Process

The following is an overview of activities in the plan update process.

1. Update Risk Assessment
 - a. How have the hazards changed?
 - b. Has development increased, decreased or remained the same?
 - c. Are there any changes in your critical facilities?
2. Update Goals & Objectives
 - a. What projects have been accomplished?
 - b. Are there some that have not been accomplished? Why?
 - c. Are there new and better ideas?
3. Update the Planning Process
 - a. Describe the process used to update the plan.
 - b. Who was involved?
 - c. Describe how each section was reviewed and how was it determined if revisions were necessary.
4. Update the intended plan maintenance process
 - a. What process and criteria will be used for evaluation and monitoring?

Once the plan update process is completed, the plan will be sent to GEMA for an initial review. Under this review, the GEMA planner will use a plan review tool to determine if the plan meets the requirements and provide comments on required and recommended revisions. GEMA will work with the planning team to make appropriate changes. Once the plan has been revised, it will be submitted by GEMA to FEMA where it will undergo a formal review. If FEMA determines the plan meets all the requirements sufficiently, then the plan will be approved. Formal approval is not granted until each of the participating jurisdictions has formally adopted the plan by resolution of the governing body.

Changes

The following is a summary of some of the changes in requirements that must be met in the plan update.

- Must include two documentable opportunities for public participation during drafting stage & to comment on final draft prior to adoption
 - Can be public hearings, website, etc.

- Risk Assessment
 - National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) repetitive loss structures vulnerability must be described in terms of types and numbers of structures.
- Goals & Objectives
 - Must have strategy for NFIP compliance spelled out, or a specific statement of why jurisdiction is not going to participate in program
- All plans submitted after October 1, 2012 must be in compliance with new FEMA Plan Review Guide.
